Dear friends, Spring has sprung! This is why we so closely tie the Christian celebration of Easter with Spring in the Northern Hemisphere. May God meet you this Easter season with flavours of resurrection hope that are bittersweet in all the best ways. And might I suggest eating a bit of chocolate as you reflect on the life, death, and resurrection of the One who came to bring new life to us all.




Lenten Book Study

This year during Lent a group of 14 members from our Community of Faith have been exploring the new United Church of Canada Lenten Study Book called *Lesser Evils :Daily Reflections on Seeking Wisdom*. The book, written by a variety of contributing authors, faith Leaders, and activists and edited by Alydia Smith offers a short scripture reading, meditation, reflection, and prayer for each day of Lent. The group has been meeting weekly at St. Paul's for discussions lead and facilitated by Rev. Carrie Martens. Group study has included a time for sharing what has 'struck us' about any of our readings, pondering our responses to the writers' perspectives, creative activities that make us think about people who have influenced us and some of our early learning and impressions on how to live, along with consideration of the study questions in the book. The overall theme is encouraging us to think about how we can draw from our faith and life experience to inform us and help us to wrestle with difficult decisions that may offer less than perfect options. This study is stimulating our thinking and is inspiring us to continue to explore how as Christians, we can seek and use wisdom, toward ethically choosing the 'lesser evil' as we face life's challenging dilemmas.



The extreme violence in Ukraine continues to be beyond words, as is the case for so many around the world who confront armed conflict in their communities.

The United Church community has raised \$402,000 for humanitarian relief so far. Of that, \$240,000 has been sent via the ACT Alliance. Spanning 127 countries, the Action by Churches Together (ACT) Alliance is the world's largest network of Protestant and Orthodox churches and agencies, including the United Church. Your generosity through Mission & Service has long supported ACT's humanitarian relief and advocacy efforts.
